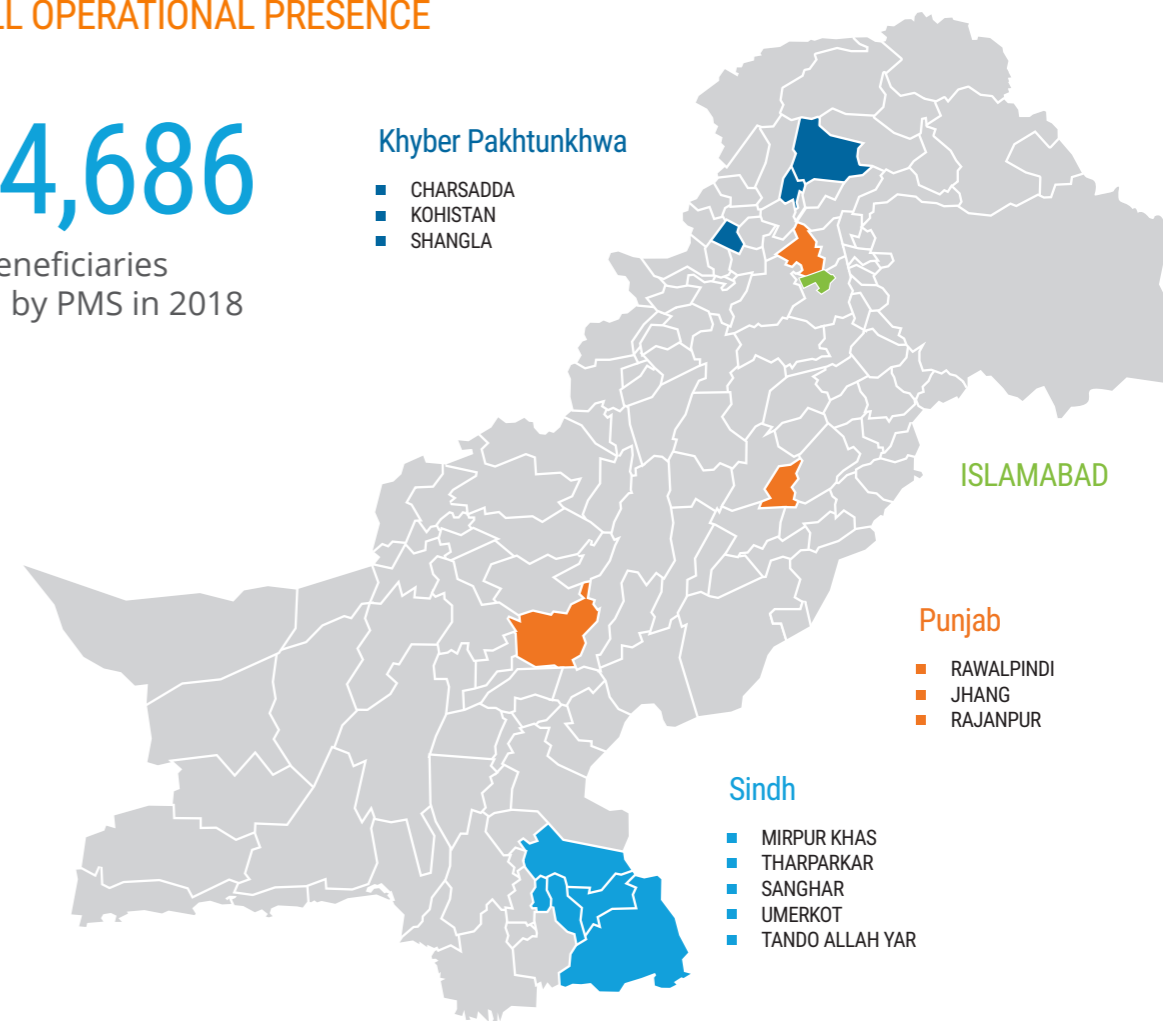

INTEGRATED WASH, DRR AND LIVELIHOOD PROJECT

Rajanpur, city is also the headquarter of Rajanpur District in the far southwestern part of Punjab, Pakistan. The district lies in the west of Indus River. It is one of the disaster prone areas of Punjab Province, Pakistan. Because of its geographic positioning, it usually remains unreached, while addressing the needs of the most vulnerable. Since 2017, PMS is transforming the lives of

poor communities in Rajanpur through a three-year integrated project; which is addressing three thematic areas namely; Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR), WASH and Livelihoods. This project is designed for 40 villages of 3 Union Councils, namely; Harand, Wah Lashari and Lundy Syedan of Tehsil Jampur, District Rajanpur. Humedica International financially contributes to this project through the generous support of the German Ministry of Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ).

OVERALL PURPOSE

Flood and hill torrent vulnerable communities in District Rajanpur are disaster-resilient and have sustainable livelihoods and well-being.

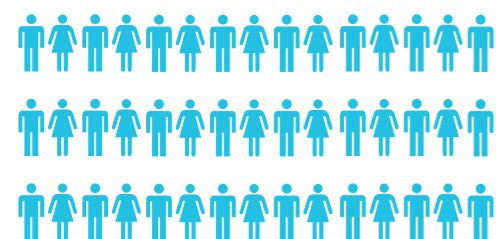

COMMUNITY VOICES

Ibrahim is a farmer and a beneficiary of kitchen gardening activity of Rajanpur Integrated WASH, DRR and Livelihood, project. Upon receiving vegetable seeds, he started growing shrubs. Other family members, including children took part in kitchen gardening who could eat nutritious grocery items. Kitchen gardening initiative has encouraged communities to invest their time and money smartly, as they are now able to save and spend their savings on family wellbeing, especially educating their children. "PMS has restored worthiness of our village life, once again." said Ibrahim

The Integrated WASH project; based on Community-Led Total Sanitation CLTS approaches, addressed health and hygiene, water and sanitation issues and restore a sense of dignity, safety and security, in Nabi Bux village in Rajanpur district. Before the project, target communities used to suffer due to open defecation, poor sanitation and unhygienic environment that caused respiratory and diarrheal disorders among the residents. PMS has sensitized rural populations to adopt health, hygiene and handwashing practices for community wellbeing; Pervaiz mentioned with a sense of ownership and pride.

WASH INTERVENTIONS: FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

4 UC's WASH PROJECT

Khipro is taluka, or a subdivision of Sanghar District in Sindh, Pakistan. It is located about 581 miles (or 935 km) South of Islamabad, the country's capital. It is bounded to the east by India. Mostly, poor populations are associated with agriculture related occupations, as cultivation is considered the main source of livelihoods of farming communities. A small percentage of rural households are also involved in animal rearing.

In 2018, PMS launched Khipro 4 UCs WASH project, that is the 3rd intervention of integrated WASH, targeting 125 villages in 4 Union Councils, namely; Dhilyar, Hathungo, Khahi and Khori. PMS chooses to up-lift rural women folks, restore their dignity and re-model their status as productive human beings.

Health of targeted communities is protected through promotion of good personal and environmental hygiene in 4 UCs of Tehsil Khipro, District Sanghar, Sindh.

CASE STORY

Hasna (38) wife of Tekam, has four children. She lives in Haji Photo Hingorjo, union council Hanthungo, taluka Khipro, district Sanghar. She works as a farm labourer. "I never imagined that through open defecation we are consuming our own faeces," said Hasna. Open defecation was widely practised in rural areas of Sindh. Pak Mission Society's team planned Community-Led Total Sanitation (CLTS) sessions, through the interactive dialogue process, demonstrating water testing and quality, benefits of proper latrine facility and drainage, discussed common disease patterns, local remedies, costs of treatment, the financial burden due to several number of laid-off days, when sick, and reasons of fatality, in case diarrhoeal infections prolonged. In fact, CLTS sessions made the participants realize the consequences of poor sanitation, health complications, prevention and disease control. Participants, like Hasna, became spokespersons who spread the word around. Realizing the magnitude of the problem, the community showed their willingness to participate in the project and to improve their living conditions and life-style behaviours for their own wellbeing.

EMPOWERED FOR GOOD

Khipro Women Empowerment Project

Khipro Integrated Women Empowerment Project was initiated with the financial help of ORA-Holland and Metter Daad in the targeted 40 most deserving and poor communities, belonging to the villages of Taluka Khipro in District Sanghar, Sindh Province of Pakistan. Women empowerment is the desired phenomena all across Sindh, because of patriarchal customs and rigid social norms which deprive women folks from basic human rights, where in most instances women are regarded as the weaker gender. A male-dominated mindset has institutionalized, extremely un-restorative codes of behaviour towards women, with the insurgence of gender discrimination.

OVERALL PURPOSE

The overall objective of this project is to empower 1200 women from 40 villages to fight poverty and water-borne diseases and enable them to involve fully in development activities to meet sustainable development goals.

COMMUNITY VOICES

Mina Kumari, wife of Kenji is the only educated woman from Yousaf Thebo village in Khipro-Sindh. Communities face health and hygiene challenges, due to scarcity of water, but in case if it is available, its found to be contaminated. Water is usually brought-over by female folks from a distance. Girls are deprived of their right to education and rather married off at an early age. PMS Project Officer met Kumari, who actively facilitated during the Detailed Need Assessment (DNA) and became a viable source of activism in the village. With the help of Kumari, we initiated a community development process and established "Self-help Groups", for integrated WASH activities. "I wish every girl has proper knowledge and guidance, on personal hygiene and self-dignity", said Kumari. Village participation in the construction of latrines, installation of Nadi filters and awareness sessions, transformed indigenous mindset into a new thinking framework. Thus, improved public wellbeing; in terms of clean drinking water, brought about behavioural change towards health and hygiene, particularly: for enhanced women's status; including girls' education and marriage right.

Rejhu (37) s/o Dhalu belongs to a marginalized community, a resident of village Shafi Muhammad Halipoto. Poverty and unjust living conditions encouraged Rejhu to think about how he could be a part of the community development process and see children get enrolled in schools. In June 2018, Pak Mission Society's project team looking for a selection of villages for Khipro women empowerment project met Rejhu, who briefed them about worries of his village. Rejhu joined as VDC member who along with his group mates attended numerous capacity-building sessions; highlighting challenges and solutions for health, hygiene and sanitation. VDC members worked-out their plans and streamlined the community development journey of their village.

"We were suffering because of lack of resources, and always thought to live in miserable conditions was our fate, however, PMS has helped us realize; we can change our destiny with collective thinking and planning," said Rejhu with hope and gratitude.

Umerkot WASH Project

Umerkot city was formerly known as Amarkot, located in Sindh province of Pakistan. Diverse religious communities, living in this area are regarded as marginalized, who are prone to drought spells, confronted with WASH emergency and continue to struggle for livelihood means, because of their social vulnerability. In 2018, PMS contributed through the following project. The project entitled "Improved relations and health of diverse faith communities through integrated WASH and peace interventions in District Umerkot, Sindh province", in collaboration between Norwegian Church Aid (NCA) and Pak Mission Society (PMS).

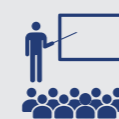

COMMUNITY VOICES

Community leader, Raheem Bakhsh shared that Pak Mission Society, implemented WASH Project in Umerkot, Sindh, and engaged diverse faith groups for greater social cohesion. It has restored women dignity and equal participation in rural workforce. The project enhanced quality of life through the provision of hand pumps, construction of communal latrines as well as health and hygiene awareness sessions. Furthermore, Village Development Committees (VDCs) encouraged unity, cooperation, volunteerism and respect for each other's religious beliefs. VDCs emerged as trend setters, who vouched for better health and clean environment at grassroots level.

Its collective voice of VDC members, that awareness sessions and WASH interventions have greatly served remote communities in remodeling their day-to-day life-style. Populations are practicing handwashing; especially, before eating and after relieving in the toilet. Communities have realized that their costs on health related treatment has been reduced. Now, availability of clean drinking water has positively impacted lives and there is a significant reduction in water borne diseases, diarrhea, skin infections, oral and dental issues among women, children and the elderly.

IMPROVED HYGIENE... IMPROVED HEALTH

Lower Sindh, WASH Project

Khipro is one of the most neglected areas of Sindh, Province in Pakistan. Social marginalization together with a rigid mindset has affected the overall community development process. Clean drinking water, poor sanitation, health and hygiene remain critically, unfulfilled needs at the grassroots level. Contaminated water and unhygienic practices continue to adversely affect health, livelihoods and wellbeing of communities. In 2018 PMS initiated Lower Sindh WASH project in 60 targeted communities in three districts namely; Mirpurkhas, Sanghar and Tando Allahyar in partnership with three consortium members i.e. Pak Mission Society (PMS), Kachi Community Development Programme (KCDA) and Parkari Community Development Programme (PCDP). The Christian Broadcasting Network – CBN funded this initiative to address most desperate issues about public health, hygiene and sanitation, allocating provision of funds for basic WASH infrastructure, awareness-raising and sensitization to improve personal wellbeing.

OVERALL PURPOSE

1,500 households have sufficient quantity of clean water through installation of 120 hand pumps and also report a reduction in open defecation and water-borne diseases with the increase in socio-economic benefits at household level as a result of project's interventions in three districts of Sindh province.

CASE STORY

Institutional public spending to address WASH issues is extremely poor across rural communities in Sindh, Pakistan. PMS WASH team visited village Pir Aga Gulam Ali Sarhandi (District Sanghar) and noticed open sewer, stagnant water, poor drainage and the groundwater for human consumption was contaminated. Open defecation was widely practised, that surely added to contagious health, personal hygiene and environment issues. WASH team was told that residents usually suffered from gastrointestinal and diarrheal complications, dental issues, scabies and even cholera in severe situations. They noticed that poor health and unhygienic practices caused an undue financial burden on the families, as well.

PMS applied CLTS approaches, involving the community through group formation and carried-out orientation, sensitization sessions and organized interactive theatre performances. Also, displayed WASH models/demos to generate public opinion and ownership by training residents to manage operations and maintenance (O&M) for smooth function of hand pumps. Awareness on general cleanliness, personal hygiene, clean drinking water, hand-washing and use of pit-latrines inspired village folks. Topics like life-style modifications, food safety, effects of open defecation transformed behaviours.

Nano (aged 49) a female Hindu devotee; is a mother of seven. Nano was the first woman to build a pit-latrine in her house, while others were still thinking. She became an influencer and motivated fellow women about hygiene practices. The villagers were convinced, once they heard Nano speak with conviction. In no time, the pit-latrine project picked up its pace. WASH through Community-Led Total Sanitation (CLTS) interventions resulted in evidence-based improvements in water and sanitation deliverables in the community. Nano is the proud beneficiary and we are indeed thankful to Nano; for her humble efforts and unbeatable activism at the grassroots level, which helped transform lives of marginalized communities.

FROM RESOLUTION TO REVOLUTION

Shangla Earthquake Rehabilitation Project

Shangla district is located in the northwest province of Kyber Pakhtunkhwa (KPK) in Pakistan. Shangla comprises three subdivisions; i.e. Alpuri, Puran and Besham Tehsil. In 2015, a powerful earthquake, measuring 7.5 magnitudes on the Richter scale, hit northern areas injuring thousands and killing hundreds of people. In early March 2016, PMS launched earthquake relief operations and continued rehabilitation of earthquake survivors through an integrated WASH project during 2018 for the development of desperate and remote communities of hill terrains in the north of Pakistan. The project in terms of the monetary value of 229 Million PKR was funded by Foreign Office Germany through Humedica International, for Linking Relief, Rehabilitation into Development (LRRD), covering 30 villages in 3 UCs of tehsil Puran, Shangla district.

OVERALL PURPOSE

Implement and promote holistic development to strengthen people's capacities, resilience and self-reliance in three Union Councils of District Shangla. Moreover, the communities will be strengthened with knowledge and skills for sustained social development through disaster management with relevant leadership structures and ensuring development and utilization of necessary plans, systems and relationships.

COMMUNITY VOICES

A widow aged 45 years was working as a maid in various households. She was already struggling financially and living with seven family members in a one-room shelter when a 7.5 magnitude earthquake hit Shangla in October 2015. Being a single mother, it was almost impossible for her to bear the losses and to rebuild her home. The construction of earthquake-resilient shelter and latrine in 2018 brought her new hope of living.

Sher Zameen (35) got paralyzed due to typhoid. After the earthquake in 2015, his government relief payment was taken away by his landowner instead of a rental. For the past 3 years, the family was living in a makeshift tent. The family was surviving only on the little amount his sons earned as labourers, abandoning their schooling. PMS came across this family and extended all possible help to the family; delivered food items along with the winterized tent. Subsequently, the family was selected as a beneficiary for provision of a one-room shelter with a latrine. "I could not believe; that someone would come and stand with us in the time of misery. I salute PMS for serving humanity without any prejudice," said Sher Zameen with hopeful eyes.

BUILDING FOR LIFE

Thar Drought Response

Tharparkar, known as Thar is one of the twenty-nine districts of Sindh province in south-eastern Pakistan. It is the largest district of Sindh province by land area, having a large number of Hindu majority, that is considered as one of the most Hindu community dominant regions all across Pakistan. It has the lowest Human Development Index (HDI) of all the districts in Sindh. Due to inadequate and erratic rain patterns, Thar Desert is a drought-prone region. The latest drought has been ongoing since 2013 and has taken a heavy toll on its populations. The recurrent drought spells have badly affected the cultivation of crops and caused livestock; either perish or move away along with the migrating households for the search of livelihoods. In 2018, PMS initiated an emergency relief response to drought-affected communities of UCs Pillu, Taluka Nagarparkar, district Tharparkar in the Sindh province, through the financial grant of ICCO-Cooperation to improve food intake among the malnourished children and food-insecure households.

OVERALL PURPOSE

To save lives, reduce suffering and maintain the dignity of those affected by the crisis, and to help them to better cope up with the situation in drought in UCs Pillu, Taluka Nagarparkar, of District Tharparkar, Sindh supported by ICCO-Cooperation.

Provision of Food items and Non-food items to 955 drought affected Households

Pakistan is experiencing an increase in the frequency and severity of drought due to a rise in temperatures, the adverse effects of El Nino and a decrease in the amount of rainfall during monsoon season. In 2018, Pakistan received 24.4 per cent less rainfall during the monsoon season, while Sindh was 69.5 percent and Balochistan 45 percent below average.

Sindh faces moderate to severe drought conditions in 8 districts while Balochistan faces the same in 18 districts. Assessments are showing that some 3 million people are affected in Sindh and 1.8 million affected in Balochistan.

Despite government relief operations, a significant number of drought-affected communities remained unattended and are resorting to coping approaches that have severely compromised the wellbeing of children and women.



COMMUNITY VOICES

2018, PMS Drought Response team reached rural Hindu communities to feed the hungry, who were facing miserable climate change effects such as prolonged food insecurity, hunger and disease which battered rural lives and livelihoods in Tharparkar district.

PMS Drought Response team provided food-ration packs to 955 households, sufficient for one month per family. Among the deserving beneficiaries, there were single mothers, whose male members were away to other cities as migrant workers. Aarti Amla was one of the recipients, whose husband had deserted her after the birth of a baby girl, and took away their elder son aged 3 and married another woman. "I am thankful to PMS for caring for downtrodden, I have been praying for some divine help to feed my newborn baby girl," said Aarti Amla

The minority populations in Pillu, Taluka Nagarparkar (Thar) are landless communities in Sindh, Pakistan, those who were already living below the poverty line. In 2018 Drought Response team came face to face, to critically food-insecure families. Livelihood options had run-out. Poor populations having a large number of family members struggled with mental trauma, anxiety and financial stress. Some of the poor pledged their services instead of cash-advance or took a loan to feed their families. Occurrences of such kind, lead to either bonded labour, escapism, the social fall-out in terms of human rights violation including early or forced marriages, rape so on and so forth. Mahi Baloch Bibi, Traditional Birth Attendant (TBA), helped PMS Disaster Response team to identify most deserving families for food-ration packs, to reach 955 households. As she was familiar with the households and could talk to females' with ease.

Mahi requested Disaster Response team to visit Rohi Palecho, expectant mother and delivered her food-ration pack. "I can only thank God for being gracious and merciful for sending us food in extreme scarcity and famine, now I can feed my children happily," said Rohi with tearful eyes.

Child Focused Integrated Community Development Project

Kohistan, "Land of Mountains", also called Abasin Kohistan or Indus Kohistan, is an administrative district within Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KPK) province of Pakistan. It is an underprivileged area with the low Human Development Index (HDI). In 2013, PMS launched Child Focused Integrated Community Development Project, in the most impoverished district of KPK intending to promote girls' education. Expanded to DRR resilience; capacity-building, infrastructure development, coping techniques with regards to the earthquake, flash floods, land and mudslides. The project supported livelihood opportunities for local labourers. Child Focused Integrated Community Development Project, has been generously funded by Kindernothilfe (KNH) Germany.

COMMUNITY VOICES

The CFICDP revived child learning in schools, with numerous Child-friendly activities like drawing competition, sports events, parent-teacher conference as well as health and hygiene sessions for school children. Child-friendly toolkits were also distributed among school children for encouragement and participation, which improved child attendance. One of the school teachers mentioned that "Interventions by PMS has an up-graded atmosphere of school learning and has raised children's interest in education." Also, handwashing practices have improved the health and wellbeing of school children.

The project aimed to facilitate community development process with local participation and address some of the unattended infrastructural needs, which used to discourage children from going to school or affect their sports activities. PMS constructed gabion wall, water channels and built pathways in most deserted locations, leading to schools. One of the school principals voiced his appreciation as saying, "No doubt we were imparting quality education, but it is PMS who has strengthened broken links; that encourage children to take on their journey of learning for a better future".

SAVING LIVES FOR FUTURE

Mother and Child Healthcare Center (MCHC)

Pattan is the district headquarter of Lower Kohistan District in Hazara Division of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KPK) Province in Pakistan. The population of the district is entirely rural and known for its rigid religious tribal norms, surrounded by challenging geographic and socio-economic conditions. For the past many years this area suffered due to lack of government's welfare intentions and continues to be the most impoverished district. Besides, agriculture, rural populations raise livestock for domestic daily use and income generation. This district was massively hit by an earthquake in 2005 and suffered flash floods in 2010, which shattered lives and livelihoods, damaging crops, livestock and road infrastructure. The target populations are deprived of their right to basic education and health on a critical note. In 2018, PMS extended its on-going Mother and Child Health Care (MCHC) in Pattan to continue to serve the rural populations all across the Kohistan Region to improve maternal and child care through the fully operational facility.

OVERALL PURPOSE

To contribute towards improved health and well-being of communities especially pregnant/lactating women (PLWs), infants and young children in Tehsil Pattan, District Lower Kohistan through a functioning Mother and Child Healthcare Centre. MCHC aims to address the immediate health needs of communities and ensure long term development in health related issues.

COMMUNITY VOICES

Muhammad Raheem belongs to village Kyal Pattan, Kohistan. In search of medical care for her daughter, Sher Bano arrived at MCHC. Sher Bano faced delivery complications during childbirth at home, that caused her a retained placenta, along with heavy bleeding. Raheem was worried about his daughter's health and kept praying for her. Sher Bano was immediately treated at the facility. Her father was informed once her condition stabilized. He was over the moon! He told the staff, ten years ago, he lost his sister, who suffered similar delivery complications because of lack of timely medical assistance. "Life and death are in the hands of God, but because of MCHC, my daughter is saved. This centre must be the answer of prayers offered by many parents who might have lost their daughters due to unavailability of medical assistance in our area," said Muhammad Raheem in sheer thankfulness.

Haleema (aged 18), wife of Shams Al-Haq had survived a complicated baby delivery when the traditional wisdom failed to cater her birth-pains. Pregnancy-related matters are considered highly private in the patriarchal, rigid, mountainous and isolated communities in the northern areas of Pakistan. But this time non-availability of a medical professional was indeed a most distressful situation for her family. Haleema's family decided to embark on a journey that was a race against time and reached MCHC, after three-hour-long travel, around 2 a.m. midnight. Traversing on the rugged roads, hoping that somebody may be available with the required technical and procedural expertise, who may assist Haleema in the critical moment of her life, upon their arrival.

Pak Mission Society's medical technicians immediately stabilized Haleema's blood pressure and ensured every possible assistance for the smooth child-birth process, immediately. MCHC Staff cleared the baby's airway, maintained arterial line and provided first aid, after which the baby cried and started breathing normally. The birth of the baby was a happy moment, not only for Haleema, who survived critical childbirth complications, but there was joy among the MCHC nurses who saved both lives of the mother and the child.

LISTEN TO THE WASTE

SAAF MAHOL Project

Solid waste management is one of the biggest challenges for developing countries including, Pakistan. Pakistan produces 48.5 million tons of solid waste, annually, that is increasing more than 2% every year. Without realizing the associated monetary value to waste, we are throwing away waste particles or keep littering scrap on roads and streets, indiscriminately.

In 2018 PMS introduced Solid Waste Management, pilot project, namely; Saaf Mahol, through the launching of Haryali Hub – waste segregation plant in H-9/2, Islamabad. The adjacent slum called Rimsha Colony was adopted as a test case, spread over 2000 households. Saaf Mahol project is designed to promote a clean environment, through daily waste collection, segregation of waste, disposing of waste and recycling of green waste for processing of organic fertilizer, funded by the Tearfund-UK.

As a waste segregator at Haryali Hub, she is now able to support her family, bear a sustenance cost and even save money through a collective community fund (committee) of nominal cash collection for personal use. She is now a proud bread earner with a grateful heart. PMS shares this joy of restoring self-esteem and dignity to a person who was struggling for a way out for her difficult circumstances. Farzana, now enjoys a decent work opportunity and financial liberty in terms of sustainable livelihood through Circular Economy, waste management project.

"I moved to Islamabad thinking my children will have at least one proper meal a day. For two years, I was looking for work, badly. Because of hunger and poor diet, my family had many restless nights. Finally, I found a place to work as an e-guard in Haryali Hub, that proved to be a life-changing opportunity, which not only enabled me to feed my children but also helped me to send them to a nearby school." says Hanif (aged 28) happily.

Shared Lives and Livelihoods (SLL) Project

Shared Lives and Livelihoods (SLL) is a pilot project, funded by ICCO-Cooperation and Kerk In Actie that is a part of the international programme "Shared Futures" designed for different faith groups to share a co-responsibility in promoting interfaith harmony through economic cooperation which ultimately leads to just social and peaceful co-existence. As an addendum, Norwegian Church Aid (NCA) contributed to achieving the goal of the project during September and December 2018, inviting mixed-faith communities from the twin-cities of Islamabad-Rawalpindi to come together and form 4 clusters through consultative meetings.

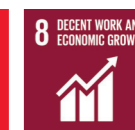


COMMUNITY VOICES

Zafar Ullah Khatak, from Burma Town, Islamabad, had a dream to become building electrician. He is a dropout from school and had a rough childhood and didn't come across any opportunity to grow in life. In October 2018, Pak Mission Society (PMS) mapped-out and identified vulnerable youth through PMS & SLDCs team members. In his interview, Zafar Ullah shared with SLL team that he was facing financial challenges and his urge is to learn any marketable trade and to be able to fight-back poverty. He further told that he wanted to become Building Electrician. His strong determination paved the way for his inclusion in the programme, which offered Zafar Ullah an opportunity to learn a life-changing trade of his chosen field. He was enrolled in the Skill Development Center (SDC) and acquired Building Electrician Skills, attending the three months training course. Besides, he attended a-three-day training on "Social Enterprise and Entrepreneurship" organized by PMS and learned about setting up of business and how to launch himself as an entrepreneur.

The three young men, Shakir Younis (22), Malik Haseeb (22) Stephen John (19) were educated friends of diverse religious communities residing in Rawalpindi. Under Shared Lives and Livelihood project; an opportunity of youth development was introduced for diverse faith communities. The opportunities included technical and vocational skills to the youth members along with the business grant of 50,000 PKR each. The idea clicked their minds, and all three friends joined hands, entering into economic cooperation to start a joint venture as "Event Managers". They aligned their ideas and with the cash grant of Rs. 50,000 each from PMS they have started their business. The provision of funds, was a key enabler towards empowerment as they purchased all relevant equipment and accessories such as sound-system, cameras, digital tools/mixture and computers, set-up a point of contact or a shop, initiated initial marketing to generate public interest by developing a brochure/handouts to attract clients. They shared that together they are impacting each other's life.

Community Awakening Through Churches

Community Awakening Through Churches (CATCH) project is a three-year intervention (2017 to 2019), based on the Umoja approach of Church and Community Transformation (CCT) model. 10 pilot and 20 non-pilot Churches have been part of this project. The Umoja approaches highlighted the core concept of holistic development, integral mission, stewardship and self-realization. The attitudinal changes, witnessed at local Church level have complemented the spirit of CATCH project in transforming the worldview of local pastoral leadership in Pakistan.

Tearfund UK under its theme of CCT has funded CATCH project, facilitating Churches and Communities, Clergy and Laypersons, who entered into more meaningful and constructive inter-personal dialogue, talking to each other, sharing their aspirations, worries and way forward guidelines for the collective good, in a respectful manner. It is believed that the CATCH project has inspired Church leadership to move ahead from "Pulpit to People", and find the Church as the body of Christ. Moreover, we are hopeful that now, Church pastors are in a better position to contextualize Biblical concepts of community development as an agent of change by assessing and addressing local community needs through their resources.

OVERALL PURPOSE

The project aims to facilitate churches to develop and refine their vision in a participatory manner and communicating it effectively to communities to see the "big picture" and understand how best to contribute to the holistic change. Umoja training sessions; highlighted vision sharing, collaborative thinking, willingness for shared success that is beyond self-interest; will lead to community development.

"I recall, schooling and college years have been very tough at times, I failed to meet extra-curricular needs; since I could not afford," affirmed Ian. Joining university became a big challenge, which was overcome after his father requested a loan amount from his employer, on pay-back terms every month. The rising living costs and schooling expenses caused mental stress to the family and at one point Ian decided to quit education. In his third semester, he came to know about Milagros Scholarship and applied for it. "I can only say that there has been a divine favour and my prayers were answered that I was blessed with a full scholarship for remaining 5 semesters," added Ian. Ian is determined to complete his engineering degree with distinction and help young students in their studies in his vicinity, especially the urban poor in Islamabad.

"I feel so honoured and blessed for being the recipient of Milagros Scholarship. I want to express my sincerest gratitude for this incredible financial help towards my academic goals," said Rameesha, proudly. She believes that growing up in a less privileged household and marginalized community, not only surprises you with day to day challenges; within the inner family circle, but as a female one has to face daunting future risks unless she has acquired a sound education, in Pakistan. On the contrary, she is of the view that her humble background has helped her appreciate her struggle to acquire higher education with a motivated mindset. Remarkably, PMS has taken an initiative to support female students to follow their pursuit of education with a fully funded program. Financial support and mentoring sessions uplifted her spirit; enabling her to pursue academic excellence and transform as a confident person. "The scholarship has helped me re-create my future destiny. Thank you for this generous support," Rameesha made a humble comment.

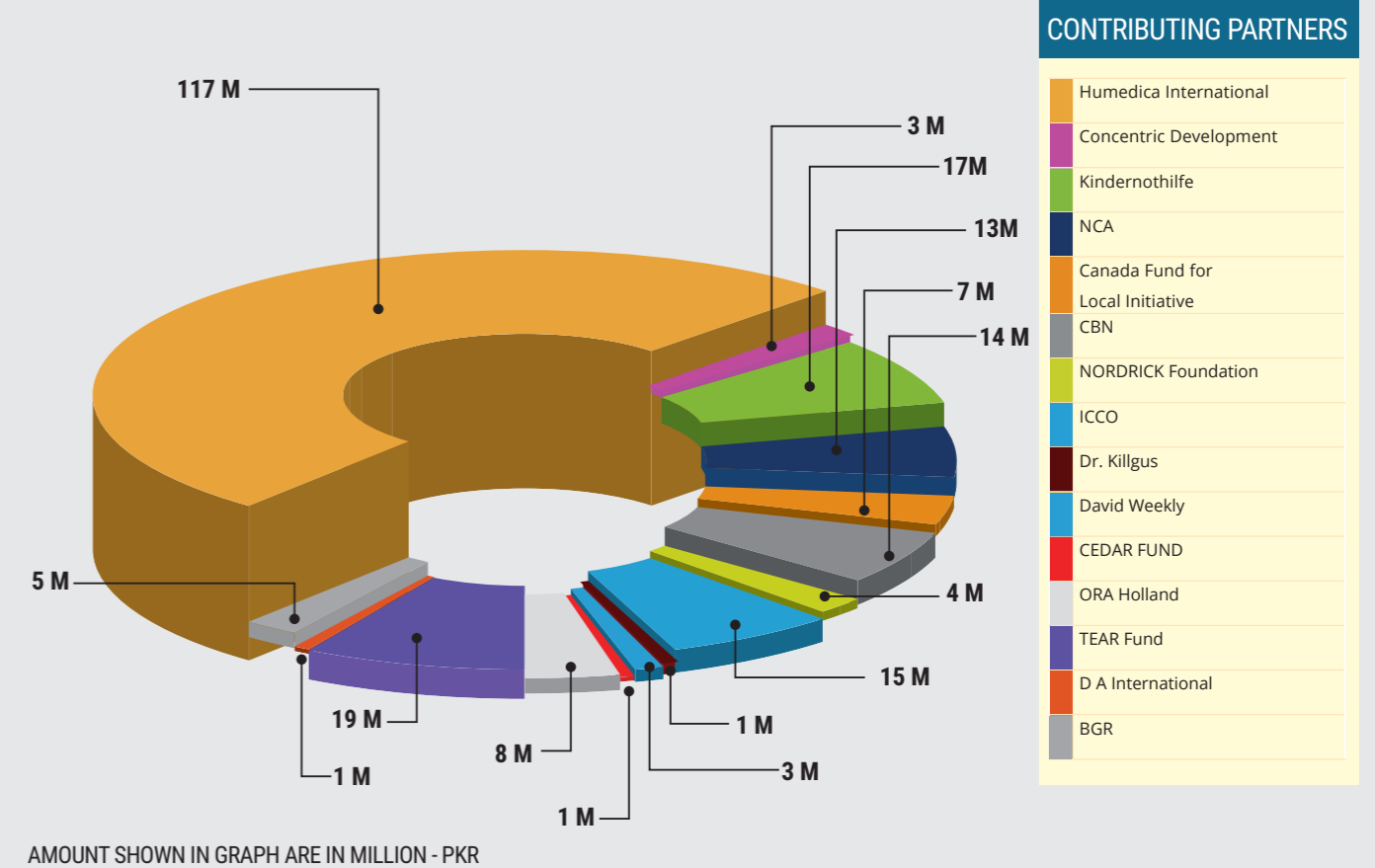

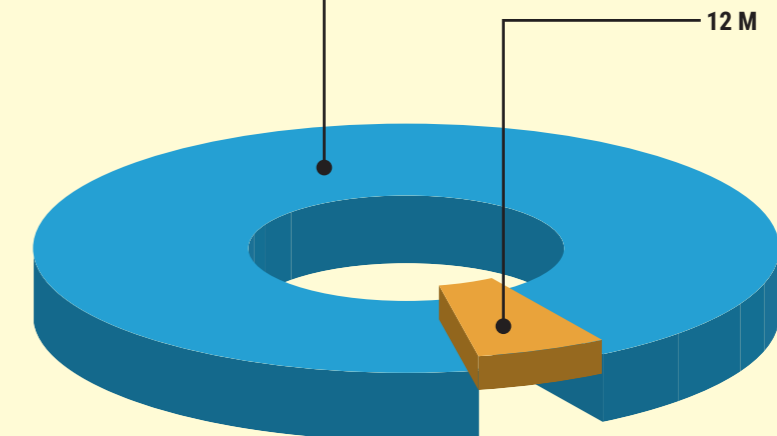

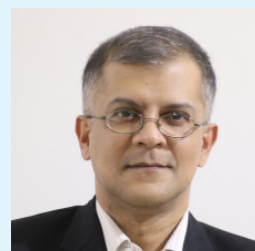
